
DIRECT INVESTIGATION: On November 10, 1939, Irving 0. Rosen stated that as of June 30, 1939, Current Assets were \$22,075, and Current Liabilities \$7,399. He stated that on sales of \$17,190, an operating profit of \$445 had been derived during the period from March 31, 1939 to June 30, 1939, and since that time operations have continued on a profitable basis.

BANK INVESTIGATION: At one local bank maintains moderate balances and no request for a scommodation. At one out-of-town bank, maintains moderate ate balances where loans have been extended on own paper in moderate amounts, the loan being outstanding at the present time.

TRADE INVESTIGATION: Following is the result of a thorough trade in-vestigation completed among principal suppliers on November 30, 1939:-




Rose reports that from the start, this business has shown operating profit but that withdrawals in recent years, to support the unprofitable Woven Products Corp. permitted only slight gains in Tangible Net Worth.

The Woven Products Corporation, according to Rosen, became inactive in June, 1939 with principal asset, its machinery, having been acquired by the holder of a \$6,000 chattel mortgage, Rosen states the mortgages acquired title to the machinery under a friendly agreement whereby it is rented to Paterson Tape Co. at a monthly rent of \$100, this money to be applied to liquidating the mortgage. In the March 31, 1939 balance sheet, the investment in the Noven Products Corporation was carried at \$10,023.89. For the year anding March 31, 1939 profits from operations are reported to have been \$4,791. This resulted in a 50% increase in Net Working Capital, but inasmuch as the investment item was written down \$3,700. Tangible Net Worth increased only \$514.

The balance sheet dated March 51, 1939 indicates a continuance of a somewhat unbalanced condition characterized by the heavy inventory which was still out of line, being equivalent to 95% of Net Working Capital. Although loans have been obtained in banking quarters to supplement net working capital, payments in trade quarters continue slow in some instances.

HISTORY: The trade style was registered by the owner on June 1, 1924.

Rosen, 40, married, and native born of Russian descent, was employed in this line up to 1920 and with another he formed a partnership to manufacture window shades at 16 Park Street, Brooklyn, N.Y. under the style Gold Rose Window Shade Manufacturing Co. In 1923 he purchased his partner's interest and during 1924 began manufacturing window shade trimmings. His business was located at various addresses in Brooklyn being moved to this address from 641 Lexington Avenue during 1933. The following year he ceased manufacturing window shades and discontinued the style of Gold Rose Manufacturing Co.

On June 26, 1935, Rosen organized and became President of Wovan Products Corp., which was engaged in manufacturing venetian blind cords and tape at 95-99 Cliff Street, Paterson, N.J. The entire output of that corporation was purchased by Rose Manufacturing Co. Rosen states that from the start, that business lost money and that during 1939, its principal asset, machinery, which was subject to a chattel mortgage of \$6,000, was acquired by the mortgagee under a friendly arrangement. According to Rosen, this arrangement provides that a new company, namely, Paterson Tape Co. of which Rosen's wife is reported to be the principal stockholder, is to rent the machinery for \$100 a month, rent being applied to liquidation of the mortgage. When the mortgage is entirely paid off, the machinery is to revert to Rosen. The Paterson Tape Co. is stated to have taken over the remaining assets and assumed the liabilities of Woven Products Corp. The entire output of the new business is purchased by Rose Manufacturing Co. Balance sheet is not available on Paterson Tape Co. but investigation indicates that the investment is somewhat small.

Records show that on September 1, 1939 Irving 0. Rosen was indicted by Federal Grand Jury in Brooklyn, on charges of violating the Wage and Hour Act, by allegedly paying wages below the minimum, in the industry. He was arrainged, on September 8, 1939 and pleaded not guilty. Bail was fixed at \$500. His case has been adjourned several times and is pending court proceedings at the present time.

METHOD OF OPERATION: 50% of volume is derived from manufacturing shade trimmings, such as fringe, tassel, and pull cords. The bulk of this manufacturing is being done by home workers. The remaining volume comes from manufacturing venetian blind cords and tape, actual manufacturing being done by Paterson Tape Co. an affiliated business, on

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METHOD OF OPERATION: (Contid)

a contract basis. Sales are made on 2-10 E.O.M. terms to approximately 200 accounts comprised of shade and venetian blind manufacturers
throughout the Northeastern United States. Occupies 5,300 square
feet of space on the second floor of a brick factory building, employs
four in the office in addition to two salesmen and approximately fifty
home workers.

FIRE HAZARD: Rents the second floor of a four story loft building, maintained in normal repair. The other occupants of the building are engaged in manufacturing lines. Adjoined on either side by four-story factory loft buildings in normal sepair. Housekeeping is orderly, Fire Record: On September 22, 1931, while located at 641 Lexington Rvenue, Brooklyn, a fire originating on the premises of others caused water damage to this company in the amount of \$1,000. A settlement of that amount was effected with the insurance company.
