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#### SEMI-MONTHLY REPORT OF MAJOR OPERATING STATISTICS WAGE AND HOUR DIVISION January 15, 1940

#### INTRODUCTION

This report of operating statistics is the first of a series of semi-monthly reports and covers the period from January 1st to January 15th, inclusive, replacing the series of bi-weekly reports heretofore issued. It presents salient information covering operations for the report period. Cumulative data from the beginning of the Act through January 15th are also presented. Certain of the summary data on enforcement and litigation, which are presented in Sections A to I, inclusive, are also presented in a series of appendix tables which show regional as well as summary totals. Appendix Table I-1, showing for each region the proportion of inspections reported to Washington which have resulted in legal action, is an addition to the series of appendix tables heretofore presented. These appendix tables are numbered to correspond with the sections of the main report which they amplify.

#### VOLUME OF WORK

Whereas final action was taken on 131 cases during this semi-monthly period, 845 new cases were added to the work load. It was determined that these cases required inspection based upon the analysis of complaints. For the previous two week period ending December 30, 1939, 1,116 cases were added to the total requiring inspection.

There have been 1,057 establishments complained against during the half month. This is a decrease of 796 or 43 per cent from the number of establishments complained against in the first half of December, 1939 but an increase of 125 or 13 per cent over the number of establishments complained against in the first half of January, 1939. As was the case a year ago, there has been a sharp drop in the number of establishments complained against in the first half of January as compared with those complained against in the first half of December. If the trend in the early months of 1940 continues to follow the same course as in the early months of 1939, the number of establishments complained against will continue to drop slightly during the

remainder of this month and February, and will then remain constant throughout the remainder of the winter and spring months. The 13 per cent increase of the first half of January of this year over January of last year may well represent the increased volume of work due to extended coverage of the Act.

Based on the analysis of the complaints filed, four out of every five establishments will require inspection. As of January 15, 1940 there have been 27,939 establishments complained against and 19,130 have been found to require inspection.

#### STATUS OF INSPECTIONS

Of the 19,130 establishments requiring inspection, 5,511 cases or nearly 29 per cent have been assigned to inspectors, and 13,619 cases or slightly over 71 per cent are pending assignment. Reports on case inspections have been submitted to Washington for 2,386 or almost 13 per cent of the total number requiring inspection. There remains 3,125 or a little over 16 per cent which are now in process of inspection.

During the half month, 84 inspection reports were forwarded to Washington for review. This is a decrease of over 35 per cent from the average of 130 inspection reports forwarded to Washington every half month for the past three months. This decrease is probably due to the fact that the field staff devoted their energies to completing action on cases which they had previously reported to Washington and which they now had authority to close. After all of these cases are disposed of, the rate at which reports are submitted to Washington should increase rapidly.

Of the 2,386 cases inspected and reported to Washington, 1,121 or 47 per cent have been finally acted on, and 1,265 or 53 per cent require further action. Of these, 33 are in the process of legal action; 158 are being considered for legal action; and the major portion of the balance of 1,074 require only the witnessing of restitution and the closing of the case.

#### CASES COMPLETED\*

There were a total of 131 cases on which final action was taken during the past half month making the total finally acted on 1,121. Of this total, 751 or 67 per

<sup>\*</sup>Under the present definition, a case is not considered "completed" until final action has been taken thereon by the Division. The number of cases on which the "inspection assignments" have been completed during this period but which have not been finally acted on because of the necessity for review by the supervising inspectors or by the legal staff is much higher than the figures presented herein. In the near future, this report will be revised to reflect the status of such work.

cent were closed by settlement, and 370 or 33 per cent were dropped. A case is considered closed by settlement when full restitution of back wages due has been secured for the employees and the establishment is operating in full compliance with the provisions of the Act. A case is dropped when the inspection of the establishment discloses no violation of the Act, or reveals that the firm is not affected by its provisions.

As indicated in previous reports, the proportion of cases closed to the total on which final action has been taken is slowly increasing. In October the proportion closed was approximately 63 per cent of the total. It is now 67 per cent. The fact that 104 cases or 76 per cent of the 131 cases finally acted on this half month have been closed by settlement, is an indication that the proportion will continue to rise. To date legal action was required on 124 or a little over 16 per cent of the 751 cases closed by settlement.

#### RESTITUTION

During this half month, restitution amounting to \$65,642.78 was paid to 3,678 employees in 104 cases. No particularly large amounts were paid. The cases settled were for the most part comparatively small cases for which the field staff was waiting for authority to close. The total amount of restitution paid to date is \$491,691.21, which was paid in 751 cases to 26,243 employees or an average amount per case of \$654.72 and an average amount per employee of \$18.74.

The data presented does not include all of the cases closed in the early period of enforcement for which no complete record is at present available. An analysis is being made based on special reports submitted by the field offices summarizing for each state the amount of restitution found due, the amount which employers have agreed to pay and the amount actually paid, together with the number of persons and establishments involved.

#### LITIGATION

During the past half month, ll injunctions were obtained. There were 12 new civil actions instituted during this period, making a total of 95 such cases to date. Eighty-seven of these cases have been completed, in all but two of which injunctions

were granted. There are now eight cases pending in district courts.

Three new cases were referred to the Department of Justice during this period, making a total of 110 cases which have been referred to that Department to date. Criminal actions have been instituted in 64 cases, 48 of which were the result of indictments and 16 the result of the filing of informations. Defendants have plead guilty in 40 cases and have been fined a total of \$247,850, of which \$132,350 has been suspended subject to the payment of back wages to employees. The remaining \$115,500 has been collected. There are 24 criminal actions pending.

#### HANDICAPPED WORKERS! APPLICATIONS

There have been 6,546 applications submitted requesting special certificates for handicapped workers which would exempt these workers from receiving the minimum wage rate prescribed by the Act. Final action has been taken on 5,392 of these applications, 275 are pending consideration, and 879 are suspended awaiting the receipt of further information before final decision can be reached. During the two week period, 189 new applications were received, and 94 applications were finally acted on. To date 2,907 certificates have been granted, 2,443 applications denied, and 42 applications cancelled or withdrawn.

#### LEARNERS • APPLICATIONS

Learners' certificates are granted on a plant basis rather than to individuals, as is the case in handling handicapped workers' applications. Therefore, the number of applications received requesting special certificates to employ learners at less than the minimum shows a smaller figure than the number of handicapped workers' applications received. A total of 1,596 applications for learners' certificates have been received to date, of which action has been taken on 1,483. Certificates were issued in 1,179 instances or, in other words, in four out of every five applications acted on.
