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SEMI-MONTHLY REPORT OF MAJOR OPERATING STATISTICS WAGE AND HOUR DIVISION February 15, 1940

INTRODUCTION

This semi-monthly report of major operating statistics covers the half month from February 1 through February 15, 1940, inclusive, and presents salient information covering operations for the period. Cumulative data from the beginning of the Act through February 15, 1940 are also presented. Certain of the data on enforcement and litigation, which are presented in Sections A to I, inclusive, are also presented in a series of appendix tables which show regional as well as summary totals. These tables are numbered to correspond with the sections of the main report which they amplify.

Several of the tables in the appendix now afford a quick comparison of the net change in the activity reported, cumulatively from one report period to another and separately from one reporting interval to another.

VOLUME OF WORK

- Final action was taken on 162 cases this semi-monthly period. This represents an increase of 17 per cent over the 140 cases on which final action was taken during the preceding period. In addition there were only 1,119 establishments found to require inspection during the first 15 days of February, as compared with 1,298 establishments found to require inspection during the last half of January. This represents a decrease of 14 per cent. Thus, while there was an increase during the period of 957 cases pending final action, the rate of increase was only 5 per cent during this reporting period, as compared with an increase of slightly more than 6 per cent during the previous period.

Complaints were received against 1,275 establishments. This represented a slight decrease of 61 complaints or not quite 5 per cent from the 1,336 establishments complained against during the last 15 days of January. Based on the analysis of complaints, four out of every five establishments appear to require inspection. As of February 15, 1940 there have been 30,362 establishments complained against and of these, 21,547 have been found to require inspection.

STATUS OF INSPECTIONS

Of the 21,547 inspections required, 2,731 or 12 per cent have been completed and 18,816 or 88 per cent are pending completion. During this reporting period 173 inspection assignments were completed, one more than the 172 inspection assignments completed during the last 15 days of January.

Of the 18,816 inspections pending completion, 3,997 or 21 per cent are in the process of inspection, and 14,819 or 79 per cent are pending assignment. The inspections in process include those which may be in the inspector's brief case pending the completion of his previous assignments, those on which the inspector is actually working, and those on which reports have been submitted to the supervising inspectors for review by them before being forwarded to Washington.

The 172 inspection assignments completed represent an average of seven-tenths of an inspection assignment completed during this reporting period for each of the 251 inspectors on duty. There is an average of approximately 16 inspections in process per inspector and an average of approximately 59 inspections pending assignment per inspector. During the period approximately one inspection was added to the work assigned to each inspector and two more inspections were accumulated to his prospective work load.

CASES ON WHICH FINAL ACTION HAS BEEN TAKEN

During the last 15 days final action was taken on 162 cases, making a total of 1,423 cases finally acted upon to date. Of this total, 981 or 69 per cent were closed by settlement — that is, the violations have been corrected and restitution secured for the employees affected; 285, or 20 per cent, were closed after inspection disclosed no violation; and 157, or 11 per cent, were dropped after it was found that the employers were not covered by the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act. From these figures, it appears that approximately one case in ten is dropped because of lack of coverage, and of the cases closed at least four out

of five are closed after the correction of violations and the securing of restitution. Of the 162 cases given final action during this reporting period, 118, or 73 per cent, were closed by settlement; 30, or 19 per cent, were closed because no violation was disclosed; and 14, or 9 per cent, were dropped because the firm was not covered by the Act.

During this half month restitution amounting to \$86,290.90 was secured for 4,015 employees in 118 cases. The total amount of restitution secured to date is \$641,438.01 paid to 33,351 employees in 981 cases. These figures include only cases which have been closed after all the restitution due has been secured. It does not include cases where partial payment has been made. Preliminary estimates of restitution found owed to employees affected by violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act, based on reports of inspectors, indicate that the amount of restitution involved exceeds \$3,000,000 at this time. This figure does not include estimates on several large cases, such as the Swift Company case, which alone appears to involve about 150,000 employees and between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 in back wages.

The average amount of restitution paid per case is \$653.86. The average amount of restitution received by each employee is \$19.23. However, the average amount received by each employee varies from as low as \$9.45 in Region I to as high as \$70.43 in Region XI.

LITIGATION

During the first half of February legal actions were instituted in 25 cases, of which 22 were by civil suits and 3 were by oriminal actions. Of the three criminal actions, one was instituted by information and two by indictment. During this period consent decrees were entered in 20 cases. No decisions on criminal cases pending were rendered.

To date there have been 205 legal actions instituted, of which 133 were civil suits and 72 were criminal actions. There have been 166 cases in which legal action has been completed, 124 of which were completed by civil action and 42 by oriminal action. There are now 39 cases pending decision in the court. Of these,

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nine were civil actions and 30 were criminal actions. In addition, the Legal Branch and the Department of Justice have considered 183 cases, which were returned to the Cooperation and Inspection Branch because they were considered not suitable for legal action. There are at present under consideration 108 cases by the Legal Branch and 37 by the Department of Justice. As shown in Section I, approximately one inspection out of every 13 has been followed up by legal action.

HANDICAPPED WORKERS' APPLICATIONS

There have been 6,794 applications submitted requesting special certificates for handicapped workers, which would exempt these workers from receiving the minimum wage rate prescribed by the Act. Final action has been taken on 5,749 or 85 per cent of these. Of the remainder, 984 or 15 per cent have been suspended pending further information before final action may be taken, and 61, or nine-tenths of one per cent, are pending consideration. Of the 5,749 which have been acted on, certificates have been granted or denied in 5,701 cases, or 99.2 per cent, and the applications have been cancelled, withdrawn or found to require no certificate in 48, or eight-tenths of one per cent. Of the 5,701 applications in which certificates were granted or denied, certificates were granted on 3,081 applications (54 per cent) and were denied for 2,620 applications (46 per cent). Of the 3,081 certificates granted, 575 were granted upon reconsideration after they had been previously denied.

LEARNERS' APPLICATIONS

A total of 1,681 applications have been received requesting special certificates for learners, which would exempt these workers from receiving the minimum wage prescribed by the Act during the period of their training. Final action has been taken on 1,455 applications or 87 per cent of the total received. Of the remainder, 13 applications or eight-tenths of one per cent have been suspended pending further action, and 213 applications or 13 per cent are awaiting consideration.

Of the 1,455 applications on which final action has been taken, certificates have been granted to the employer in 1,120 cases or 77 per cent of the total; and

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certificates have been denied for 326, or 25 per cent. The remaining 9 which constitute six-tenths of one per cent of the total were cancelled or withdrawn.

As a result of an inventory of the records in the Learners' Unit, revisions have been made in the cumulative data reported in Items N and O. Thus, the cumulative totals of the preceding report plus the data for the current reporting period will not agree with the cumulative data reported herein.
