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SEMI-MONTHLY REPORT OF MAJOR OPERATING STATISTICS WAGE AND HOUR DIVISION February 29, 1940

INTRODUCTION

This semi-monthly report of major operating statistics covers the period from February 16 through February 29, 1940, inclusive, and presents salient information covering operations for the period. Cumulative data from the beginning of the Act through February 29, 1940 are also presented. Certain of the data on enforcement and litigation, presented in Sections A to I, inclusive, are also presented in a series of appendix tables which show regional as well as summary totals. These tables are numbered to correspond with the sections of the report which they amplify.

Several of the tables in the appendix now afford a quick comparison of the net change in the activity reported, cumulatively from one report to another and separately from one reporting interval to another. The figures in Region VI for this period and the previous reporting period have been revised to include complete data on the operations of the North Carolina State Department of Labor, which is cooperating with the Division in enforcement of the Act. This is the first cooperating agency—to report its activities in connection with the enforcement of the Fair Labor Standards Act. Cumulative totals for Regions III and V have been adjusted to allow for the shift of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall counties in West Virginia from Region V to Region III.

The sections on exemptions for handicapped workers have been revised. Former Section M, showing decisions made after reconsideration of applications, has been replaced by new Sections M and N. New Section M shows the proportion of applications granted on first consideration without further action, the proportion granted on reconsideration after having been denied on first consideration, etc. New

Section N shows similar data for denials. By relating action on reconsideration to original actions, more significance is given the data.

VOLUME OF WORK

Final action was taken on 208 cases during this semi-monthly period. This represents an increase of 28 per cent over the 162 cases finally acted on during the first half of February. At the same time only 954 additional establishments were found to require inspection during this half month, as compared with 1,119 additional establishments found to require inspection during the preceding half month. As a result there was an increase of only 746 cases pending final action during this period, as compared with an increase of 957 during the previous period. The rate of increase in the cases pending final action during this half month was only four per cent, as compared with five per cent for the first half of this month.

This is the second successive reporting period in which the rate of increase of the number of cases pending final action has shown a decline. While this decline has been partially due to the increased number of cases on which final action has been taken, it has been due chiefly to the decline in cases found to require inspection.

Region XIII reported 52 cases closed or dropped during this period and contributed largely to the total number of cases on which final action had been taken.

Region XIII accounted for exactly 25 per cent of the cases closed or dropped. As a result of the activity in the Region, the number of cases pending final action on February 29th was 10 less than on February 15th (as shown in Table D-la, column 10). This is the first reporting period in which the cases pending final action have decreased during the period in any region.

Complaints were received against 1,198 establishments, making a total of 31,641 establishments complained against to date. This represented a slight decrease of 77 establishments or six per cent from the 1,298 establishments complained against during the previous period. Based on the analysis of complaints through February 29th, there have been 22,600 establishments found to require inspection.

STATUS OF INSPECTIONS

Of the 22,600 inspections required by the complaints presumed to be valid,

2,887 or 13 per cent of them have been completed, and 19,713 or 87 per cent are

pending completion. During this reporting period 152 inspection assignments were

completed or 23 less than the 175 completed during the preceding period. During the entire month of February, however, 327 inspections were completed as compared with 256 in January. This represents a gain in February over January of 71 inspections completed, or an increase of 28 per cent.

Of the 19,713 inspections pending completion, 4,718 or 24 per cent are in the process of inspection and 14,995 or 76 per cent are pending assignment. The inspections in process include those which are being held by the inspector while he completes his previous assignments, those on which the inspector is actually working, and those on which the inspector has completed his report but which are awaiting review before being forwarded to Washington.

the 152 inspection assignments completed represent an average of six-tenths of an inspection assignment completed per inspector during this repreting period for the 263 inspectors on duty, as compared with seven-tenths of an inspection asignment completed by the 251 inspectors on duty during the previous half tenth.

Inasmuch as final action was taken on 208 cases during this period, it would appear that the field staff had devoted its time to cleaning up a number of cases pre-tous-

There is an average of 16 inspections in process in the hands of each inspector and an average of 57 inspections per inspector pending assignment. Compared with the preceding half month when there was an average of 16 inspections per inspector in process and an average of 59 inspections per inspector pending assignment, it would appear that the inspections in process per inspector had been increased by two and the inspections pending assignment per inspector had decreased by two.

CASES ON WHICH FINAL ACTION HAS BEEN TAKEN

During the last half of February final action was taken on 208 cases, making a total of 1,631 cases on which final action has been taken to date. Of this total, 1,446 or 89 per cent were found to come under the provisions of the Act and full inspection was made; and 185 were found not to be covered by the Act and were dropped. Of the 1,446 cases in which full inspection was made, 1,137 or 79 per cent were closed by settlement after violations had been found, and 309 or 21 per cent were closed after the employer was found to be in compliance. These facts would indicate that of establishments complained against which are in the enforcement area, four out of five are found to be violating the Act. Of the 180 inspections closed during the current period, 156 or approximately five out of six disclosed violations.

During the month 370 cases were closed or dropped. This represents an increase of 44 per cent over the 257 cases closed during January, and is over two and a half times the number of cases closed in December. The number of cases on which final action has been taken during the half month has substantially increased each reporting period since operations on a decentralized basis were begun.

RESTITUTION SECURED

During the half month restitution amounting to \$104,632.60 was secured for 4,959 employees in 156 cases. The total amount of restitution secured to date is \$746,070.61 to 38,310 employees in 1,137 cases which have been closed by settlement. In addition it is estimated that over \$50,000 has been made as partial payments on cases which have not yet been closed.

In addition to the restitution paid, there has been approximately \$1,100,000 in restitution which employers have agreed to pay, of which \$425,000 was agreed to as the result of court action, and \$675,000 was agreed to voluntarily after the field staff had made inspection.

It is also estimated that if all restitution which has been found due by the inspection staff is eventually paid, the amount will be over \$3,500,000. This figure does not include the Swift Company case which may, if the Division's interpretation of the Act is sustained, involve between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 in back wages.

The average amount of restitution paid per case is \$656.17 and the average amount of restitution paid per employee is \$19.47. The average per case varies from a low of \$231.11 in Region III to a high of \$2,260.42 per case in Region VI. The average per case varies from \$8.58 in Region XIII to \$71.77 in Region XI.

LITIGATION

During the last half of February legal actions were instituted in 25 cases of which 19 were civil suits and six were criminal actions. Of the six criminal actions, four were instituted by information and two by indictment. During this period consent decrees were entered in 17 cases. In one criminal action the defendant plead guilty. In this case a fine of \$5,500 was imposed and collected.

To date there have been 230 legal actions instituted, of which 152 were civil suits and 78 were criminal actions. Of the 78 criminal actions, 24 have been instituted by information and 54 by indictment. There have been 184 cases in which legal action has been completed, 141 of which were civil actions, completed by the entering of consent decrees; and 43 were criminal actions, completed by the defendant entering a plea of guilty. In the criminal actions completed, a total of \$260,350 in fines has been imposed and \$128,000 of this amount has been collected. The balance of \$132,350 has been suspended upon the condition that the defendants make restitution to their employees in full.

Of the 2,887 inspections completed to date, legal action has been instituted on 230 or 8 per cent of them.

HANDICAPPED WORKERS' APPLICATIONS

During the past half month 92 applications for exemptions from the provisions of the Act for handicapped workers were secured, and final action was taken on 96. To date there have been 6,886 such applications received and final action has been taken on 5,845. Of the remaining 1,041 applications, 961 are pending the receipt of additional information and 80 are pending consideration. Of the 5,845 applications on which final action has been taken, requests for reconsideration have been received on 1,201 or 20.5 per cent of them. Reconsideration has been completed on 1,139 and 62 are pending completion of reconsideration.

Of the total applications on which final action has been taken, 5,790 have been either granted or denied, and 55 applications cancelled or withdrawn. Of the 5,790 applications granted or denied, 3,175 or 55 per cent have been granted and 2,615 or 45.2 per cent have been denied. The ratio of applications granted to applications denied is approximately six to five.

LEARNERS : APPLICATIONS

During this period 29 applications were received from establishments requesting exemptions from provisions of the Act for learners and final action was taken
on the same number. To date 1,710 applications have been received and final action
has been taken on 1,488. Of the 1,488 applications on which final action has been
taken, 1,122 or 75 per cent have been granted, 357 or 24 per cent have been denied
and 9 or six-tenths of one per cent have been cancelled or withdrawn.
