DAUGHERTY NAMED CHIEF ECONOMIST

Elmer F. Andrews, Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division of the U.S. Department of Labor, today announced the appointment of Carroll R. Daugherty, former Professor of Economics at the University of Pittsburgh, to be Chief Economist.

Mr. Daugherty was a member of the Minimum Wage Board for the Laundry Industry of the State of Pennsylvania, serving as a public representative from February to June, 1938. He was in charge of the labor productivity studies of the auto and iron and steel industries made by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in 1936. From 1928 to 1931 he taught labor economics at the University of Alabama and was in charge of student placement of the School of Business. From 1925 to 1928 he taught economics at the Wharton School of Finance, University of Pennsylvania.

He is the author of "Labor Problems in American Industry", a widely used college textbook, and also author of "Labor in the NRA". He was co-author of "Economics of the Iron and Steel Industry", which was published in 1937.

Mr. Daugherty received his M.A. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1924, and in 1927, his Ph.D.
