COTTON STORAGE SCHEDULED FOR SEASONAL EXEMPTION

Exemption for the storing of raw cotton in bales from the maximum hours provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act as a "seasonal" industry was indicated today when Colonel Philip B. Fleming, Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division, U. S. Department of Labor, issued a preliminary determination that a prima facie case had been made for classifying this industry as seasonal in nature. A fifteen-day period during which objectors may be heard will elapse before a final determination is made by the Administrator.

As a "seasonal" industry, the storing of raw cotton in bales may be carried on for 12 hours in any workday or for 56 hours in any workweek, as the case may be, for a period or periods aggregating 14 workweeks in any calendar year before the overtime provisions requiring payment of at least time and one-half the regular rate of pay become effective.

The Administrator's action was taken on the application of the National Cotton Compress and Cotton Warehouse Association. (Federal Register, August 31, 1940)

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
