WAGE-HOUR ADMINISTRATOR RULES ON EMPLOYEES PRODUCING MACHINERY AND MACHINERY PARTS USED IN PRODUCTION OF GOODS FOR COMMERCE

Four types of employees producing machinery or machinery parts are entitled to the minimum wage and overtime provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, according to L. Metcalfe Walling, Administrator of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions of the U. S. Department of Labor.

The following employees, according to Mr. Walling, are engaged in occupations or processes necessary to the production of goods for interstate commerce and therefore are entitled to the coverage provided by the Fair Labor Standards Act:

Those engaged in producing machinery for sale within the State to another manufacturer who in turn uses that machinery to produce goods for interstate commerce.

Those engaged in producing completed parts for sale to another manufacturer within the State who installs them as replacements for worn out parts in machinery used in the production of goods for interstate commerce.

Those engaged in repairing or reconstructing machine parts which are installed within the State in machinery used in the productions of goods for interstate commerce.

Those engaged in installing within the State new or repaired parts to replace worn out parts in machinery used in the production of goods for interstate commerce.
