## A BILL

To regulate interstate commerce in goods, wares, and merchandise manufactured, produced, or mined by persons under                    years of age, and for other purposes.

1        *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2        *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*  
3        That all goods, wares, and merchandise manufactured, pro-  
4        duced, or mined, wholly or in part, by persons under  
5        years of age, transported into any State or Territory of the  
6        United States and remaining therein for use, consumption,  
7        sale, or storage, shall upon arrival and delivery in such State  
8        or Territory be subject to the operation and effect of the laws  
9        of such State or Territory to the same extent and in the same  
10       manner as though such goods, wares, and merchandise had  
11       been manufactured, produced, or mined in such State or Ter-

1 ritory, and shall not be exempt therefrom by reason of being  
2 introduced in the original package or otherwise.

3       SEC. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person know-  
4 ingly to transport or cause to be transported, in any manner  
5 or by any means whatsoever, or aid or assist in obtaining  
6 transportation for or in transportng any goods, wares, and  
7 merchandise manufactured, produced, or mined wholly or in  
8 part by persons under               years of age from one State,  
9 Territory, or District of the United States, or place non-  
10 contiguous but subject to the jurisdiction thereof into any  
11 State, Territory, or District of the United States, or place  
12 noncontiguous but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, where  
13 said goods, wares, and merchandise are intended by any per-  
14 son interested therein to be received, possessed, sold, or in  
15 any manner used, either in the original package or other-  
16 wise, in violation of any law of such State, Territory, or  
17 District of the United States, or place noncontiguous but  
18 subject to the jurisdiction thereof.

19       SEC. 3. All packages containing any goods, wares, and  
20 merchandise manufactured, produced, or mined wholly or in  
21 part by persons under               years of age, when shipped  
22 or transported in interstate commerce, shall be plainly and  
23 clearly marked, so that the name and address of the shipper,  
24 the name and address of the consignee, the nature of the

1 contents, and the name and location of the plant, factory, or  
2 other establishment where produced wholly or in part may  
3 be readily ascertained on an inspection of the outside of such  
4 package.

5       SEC. 4. Any person violating any provision of this Act  
6 shall for each offense, upon conviction thereof, be punished  
7 by a fine of not more than \$1,000, and such goods, wares,  
8 and merchandise shall be forfeited to the United States, and  
9 may be seized and condemned by like proceedings as those  
10 provided by law for the seizure and forfeiture of property  
11 imported into the United States contrary to law.

12       SEC. 5. Any violation of this Act shall be prosecuted in  
13 any court having jurisdiction of crime within the District or  
14 Territory in which said violation was committed, or from or  
15 into which any such goods, wares, or merchandise may have  
16 been carried or transported contrary to the provisions of this  
17 Act.
